What is it?

Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE), also known as mad cow disease, is a progressive neurological disorder found in cattle. When cattle have this disease, it begins to deteriorate the brain and nervous system.

BSE is one of the few <u>prion diseases</u> found in animals. There are others that affect people, including <u>Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease</u>. Prion diseases are rare neurodegenerative disorders that are rapidly progressive and are always fatal to the infected party.

How does this affect people?

According to the CDC, there's a casual association between BSE and <u>variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob</u> <u>Disease (vCJD)</u>. Consumption of BSE-contaminated food could lead to vCJD, which is a deadly <u>prion disease</u> and has no known treatment.
