Whereas, rural South Dakota is a great place for dedicated health professionals to deliver essential health services and provide comprehensive, individualized care; and,

Whereas, individuals, organizations, businesses, and community leaders should support initiatives focused on improving rural healthcare access, addressing health disparities, and strengthening rural healthcare systems:

Now, Therefore, I, Kristi Noem, Governor of the State of South Dakota, do hereby proclaim November 21, 2024, as

in South Dakota and encourage citizens to join me in celebrating the "Power of Rural" and recognizing the vital contributions and achievements of healthcare providers, organizations, and other stakeholders serving rural areas.
