

# **STRUCTURE**

**Goal:** Improve child and family health outcomes through a community-driven assessment of needs, prioritization of public health issues, and multi-sector approach for strategic action.

### **Guiding Frameworks**

$\cup$	<b>Life Course Theory: an integrated continuum.</b> This perspective suggests that the many
	facets of life contribute to health outcomes across the course of one's life. It builds
	on public health and social science literature which highlight the influence of each
	stage of life on the next and shows how social, economic, and physical environments
	interact to have a profound impact on individual and community health.



### **Guiding Principles**

- 1. Reduce duplication of effort
- 2. Evidence-based decision making
- 3. Multi-sector approach that builds sustainable partnerships
- 4. Health equity focused
- 5. Ongoing engagement with diverse community members and working partners, including groups disproportionately impacted by health inequities.

# **INFORMATION GATHERING & DATA COLLECTION**

☐ Integral to a comprehensive process, including understanding health inequalities across the life course is to gather information and collect data from key stakeholders, populations served by OCFS programs, and partners. Methods will include a public input survey, regional partner and community meetings, and examining already collected data.

# STAKEHOLDER & PARTNER ENGAGEMENT

**Role:** Support data collection and information gathering, identification of additional partners and stakeholders, priority setting, and implementation of statewide plans to ensure a comprehensive assessment of OCFS program needs and assets across South Dakota and inform OCFS planning.

**Participation:** Stakeholders are asked to participate in information gathering and data collection methods outlined, including large in-person meetings to support collective input regarding gaps and strengths of OCFS programs and services, population health needs, and priorities to address needs. In-person meetings will be held in throughout the state in Spring 2024.

### **COMMUNICATION PLAN**

	<b>Monthly Updates to Stakeholders and Partners:</b> Updates will be disseminated via e-mail regarding progress. of the needs assessment process, opportunities for engagement, and information as needed.			
	<b>Local engagement of stakeholders and partners:</b> Engagement will occur through local OCFS meetings, partners, and outlets to reach stakeholders and partners.			
	<b>Digital, radio, and print marketing</b> will be utilized to invite engagement in the needs assessment process and data collection.			

# **CALL TO ACTION**

To support a comprehensive and successful needs assessment process, consider the following:

- ASK
- Who needs to be at the "table"? Identify additional stakeholders, partners, and populations served to support comprehensive information gathering and data collection that assess the life course and examine health inequities.
- ASK
- Where can stakeholders and partners be reached? Identify community or statewide events and additional opportunities to reach stakeholders and partners to elicit input on data collection.
- ASK
- What data sources or information are available to support information gathering and data collection? Identifying data would support understanding the populations served by OCFS programs and services, as well as those populations who should be served.
- ASK
- How can help promote the needs assessment process and engagement? It will be important to promote the needs assessment process through stakeholders and partners, including inviting the public, partners, and stakeholders to participate in data collection methods. Opportunities to promote engagement will include the promotion of opportunities to participate in data collection through social media platforms, e-mail listsery, and personal communication.
